About the Montessori Philosophy

Developed by Dr. Maria Montessori in the early 1900s, the Montessori Method encourages children to learn through hands-on exploration and independence. This guide shows how to bring Montessori principles into your home.

1. Setting Up a Montessori Home Environment

- Keep spaces calm, uncluttered, and organized with natural light and neutral tones
- Limit activities on display (6–10 at a time)
- Use child-sized furniture and reachable storage
- Define learning areas (reading, play, practical life, rest)

2. Practical Life Activities

- Involve your child in simple chores: watering plants, setting the table, folding laundry
- Use a step stool for sink and kitchen activities
- Offer accessible child-sized tools: broom, watering can, jug
- Encourage tidying up and personal care

3. Sensorial & Creative Exploration

- Introduce natural textures: wood, stones, fabric
- Play soft music or let them experiment with simple instruments
- Introduce and rotate art materials: crayons, watercolour, and clay
- Offer sorting or matching activities (by colour, size, texture)

4. Language & Early Literacy

- Read aloud together every day
- Use real, clear language—label familiar items (cup, chair, door)
- Cozy, accessible reading nook and rotate books regularly
- Encourage storytelling and singing

5. Math & Problem Solving

- Count and sort items while cooking, cleaning, or walking
- Compare shapes, sizes, and colours
- Use stacking toys, number puzzles, or beads
- Let them measure ingredients while baking

6. Nature & Outdoor Learning

- Go on daily walks to explore and observe the weather and seasonal changes
- Collect leaves, stones, or flowers for sorting
- Garden or grow simple plants together
- Create a small outdoor workspace or sand area

7. Routine & Rhythm

- Establish routines for meals, rest, and play with a picture-based daily schedule
- Allow time for unstructured play
- Build in “quiet focus time” each day
- End the day with reflection or storytelling

Parent Reflection Corner

Take a few minutes each week to reflect on your child's progress and interests:

- What did my child explore with curiosity this week?
- How did I support their independence today?
- What can I adjust in our space to match their interests?
